Introduction to MANUVIKASA

1. Organizational Overview

MANUVIKASA is a registered non-governmental organization established in 2003, originating from Karjagi Village in Siddapur Taluk of Uttara Kannada District, Karnataka. It is a non-profit, non-political organization committed to the conservation of natural resources, promotion of sustainable livelihoods, strengthening of rural education, and nurturing of human values.

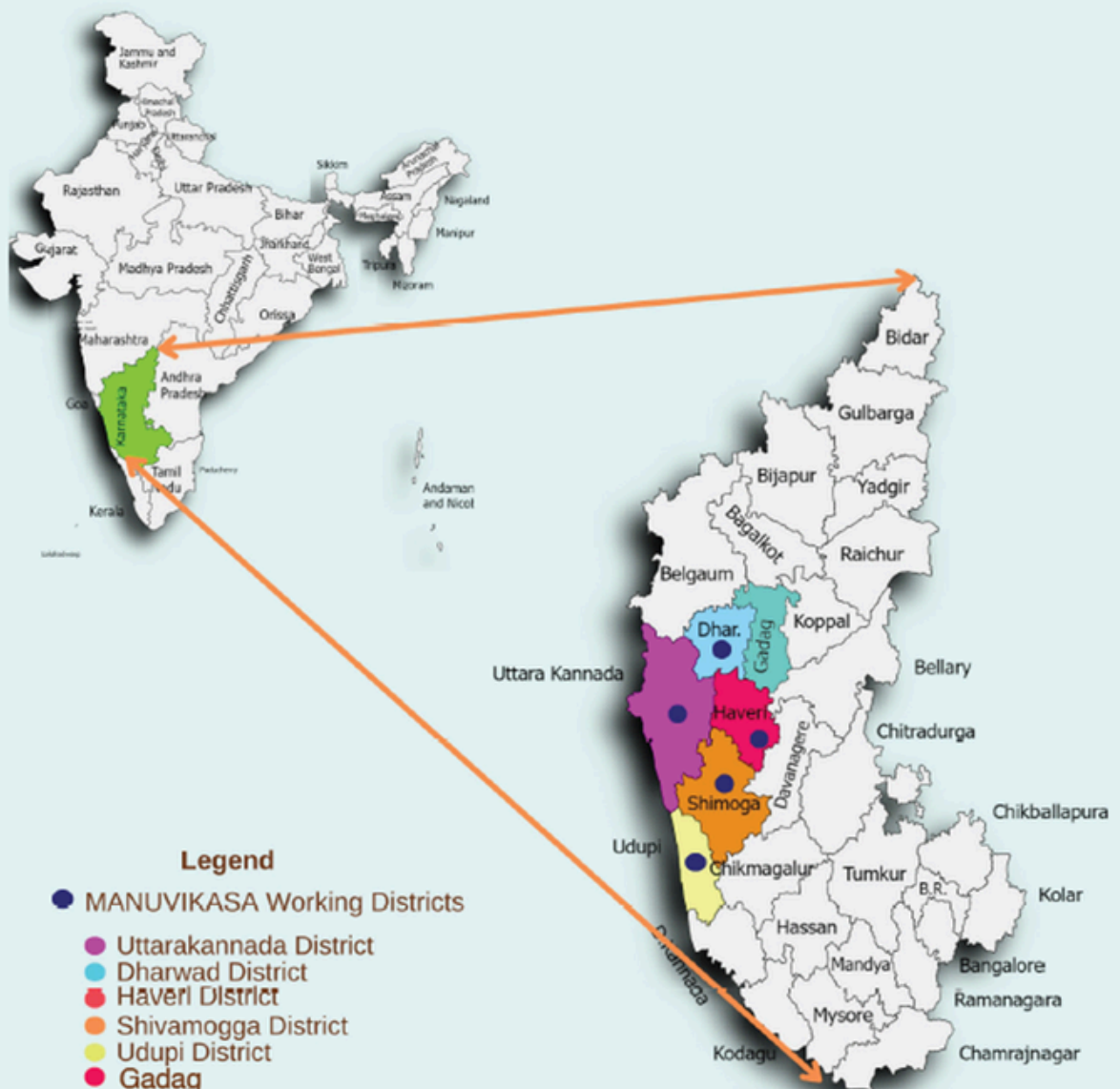
The organization works across six districts of Karnataka: Uttara Kannada, Dharwad, Shivamogga, Udupi, Gadag, and Haveri covering ecologically diverse regions such as the Western Ghats, coastal belts, and drought-prone plains. MANUVIKASA's interventions span 26 taluks and approximately 1,300 villages, focusing on regions facing ecological stress, agrarian distress, and social vulnerability.

MANUVIKASA operates in ecologically sensitive and socio-economically vulnerable regions characterized by forest fringes, coastal ecosystems, and dryland farming systems. These regions face challenges such as environmental degradation, water scarcity, declining soil fertility, livelihood insecurity, and limited access to education and public services; particularly among small and marginal farmers, women, fisherfolk, and tribal communities.

The organization primarily works with:

- Small and marginal farmers dependent on rainfed agriculture.
- Landless agricultural labourers and informal rural workers.
- Women, especially members of SHGs and JLGs.
- Children and adolescents from economically weaker and first-generation learner households.
- Rural youth, including unemployed and school dropouts.
- Tribal communities, particularly forest-fringe populations such as the Siddi community.
- Fisherfolk and fisherwomen engaged in marine and inland fisheries.
- A significant proportion of beneficiaries belongs to SC, ST, OBC, minority, and BPL households, ensuring an inclusive and equity-focused development approach.

Our Working Area



2. Natural Resource Management and Water Conservation

To address environmental degradation and water insecurity, MANUVIKASA has implemented large-scale, community-led natural resource management initiatives, including:

- Lake rejuvenation
- Farm pond construction
- Betta (hill land) conservation
- Percolation tanks and soak pits

Key Achievements:

- 3813 farm ponds developed
- 337 lakes rejuvenated (3–30 acres each), storing 2784 million litres annually
- 2,784,700 cubic meters of silt excavated
- 15067 soak pits constructed
- 10245 million litres of rainwater conserved annually
- Over 19,000 farmers directly benefited
- 25,000 hectares of dry land brought under protective irrigation

These interventions have improved groundwater recharge, enhanced soil moisture, revived local biodiversity, reduced soil erosion, and strengthened climate resilience.





River Revival and Wildlife Sanctuary Linkages

MANUVIKASA is implementing river revival initiatives for three ecologically significant rivers of the Western Ghats—Aghanashini, Varada, and Gangavali (Bedti)—with a focus on catchment restoration, source protection, and community-led conservation. Interventions include lake rejuvenation, farm ponds, forest soak pits, spring protection, native plantations, and soil–moisture conservation, aimed at improving groundwater recharge and sustaining perennial river flows.

The catchments of these rivers are ecologically linked to the Dandeli and Sharavathi Wildlife Sanctuaries, which depend on healthy river systems and intact riparian zones. By restoring upstream catchments and strengthening water availability in forest fringes, MANUVIKASA's work helps sustain wildlife habitats, maintain biodiversity corridors, and reduce human–wildlife conflict. This integrated landscape approach supports both river health and protected area conservation while strengthening climate resilience and rural livelihoods.

Approach Paper

MANUVIKASA has published this Approach Paper with the support of the Forestry College, Sirsi, and Hanns Seidel Foundation (HSS), presenting an integrated watershed management framework for the Aghanashini, Varada, and Bedthi/Gangavali river basins in Uttara Kannada, Karnataka. The paper integrates scientific analysis with community perspectives from hilly, coastal, and plain regions of the Western Ghats. It highlights critical challenges such as groundwater depletion, climate variability, and livelihood vulnerability, and proposes practical interventions including lake rejuvenation, betta land treatment, soil and moisture conservation, and community-led institutional strengthening. The document serves as a strategic guide for promoting water security, ecological sustainability, and climate-resilient rural livelihoods.

Carbon Sequestration and Climate Mitigation Contribution

MANUVIKASA's integrated interventions in water conservation, sustainable agriculture, forestry, and clean energy contribute significantly to carbon sequestration and greenhouse gas (GHG) emission reduction across rural Karnataka. Through large-scale lake rejuvenation, farm pond construction, betta land treatment, and forest water harvesting pits, the organization enhances soil moisture, biomass growth, and groundwater recharge, leading to increased soil organic carbon and vegetative carbon stocks.

Key contributors to carbon mitigation include the conservation of 30,000 acres of community forests, plantation of 44,000 native tree saplings, promotion of Integrated Farming Systems (IFS), adoption of System of Rice Intensification (SRI) (reducing methane emissions), and installation of smokeless and energy-efficient cooking stoves, which significantly reduce firewood consumption and household emissions.

Based on conservative estimates using standard emission factors, MANUVIKASA's cumulative interventions generate an annual carbon sequestration and emission reduction potential of approximately 22,036.5 tCO₂e per year. This is equivalent to removing nearly 4,800 petrol cars from the road annually. Beyond carbon credits, these actions deliver strong co-benefits, including improved biodiversity, climate resilience, reduced deforestation pressure, and enhanced rural livelihoods.

3. Sustainable Agriculture, SRI Paddy & Seed Conservation

MANUVIKASA promotes climate-resilient and low-cost sustainable agriculture practices to enhance farm productivity while reducing ecological stress.

Key focus areas include:

- System of Rice Intensification (SRI) paddy cultivation, enabling 800 farmers to reduce water use, seed rate, and chemical inputs while increasing yields
- Promotion of indigenous and climate-resilient seed varieties
- Community-based seed conservation and seed exchange systems
- Training on soil health management, organic inputs, vermicomposting, and integrated nutrient management

Through farmer trainings, demonstrations, and Farmer Field Schools, hundreds of farmers have adopted SRI methods and traditional seed varieties, resulting in improved productivity, reduced cultivation costs, and enhanced food security.

MANUVIKASA promotes women-led seed conservation as a cornerstone of sustainable agriculture and climate resilience.

- 500+ women farmers actively engaged in seed conservation initiatives
- 80+ indigenous and traditional vegetable varieties conserved and regenerated
- Community seed banks and local seed exchange systems promoted
- Reduced dependence on external and hybrid seed markets
- Enhanced household nutrition, crop diversity, and climate adaptability

Women seed custodians play a critical role in preserving local agrobiodiversity, ensuring seed sovereignty, and passing traditional knowledge to future generations.



4. Women's Empowerment, Capacity Building, SHGs & MGNREGA Convergence

Women's empowerment is a core pillar of MANUVIKASA's development approach. The organization works systematically to mobilize rural women into Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and Joint Liability Groups (JLGs) to strengthen financial inclusion, leadership, collective action, digital capability, and livelihood security. These women-led institutions serve as platforms for savings, credit access, skill development, digital and financial literacy, social empowerment, and effective linkage with government welfare schemes.



Major Interventions

a. Promotion and Strengthening of SHGs and JLGs

MANUVIKASA has facilitated the formation of 3049 SHGs and 1500 JLGs, bringing together over 65,000 rural women, predominantly from small and marginal farmer households, landless families, SC/ST, minority, and other vulnerable communities. Women are trained in group management, bookkeeping, savings discipline, internal lending, leadership development, and federation building, enabling them to manage institutions independently and sustainably.



b. Financial Inclusion, Digital Literacy, and Access to Credit

Through SHGs, JLGs, banks, microfinance institutions, and a women-focused cooperative, MANUVIKASA has enabled women's access to affordable institutional credit. To date, ₹125 crore in microcredit has been facilitated, supporting women to strengthen existing livelihoods or initiate new income-generating activities such as tailoring, dairy, catering, poultry, petty trade, and food processing.

In parallel, MANUVIKASA actively promotes digital and financial literacy, enabling women to use bank accounts, ATM services, UPI-based digital payments, mobile banking applications, insurance platforms, and government portals. These interventions have significantly reduced dependence on intermediaries, enhanced transparency in financial transactions, and minimized the risk of financial fraud.



c. Women Training and Capacity Building

Training and capacity building of women is a core component of MANUVIKASA's women empowerment strategy. The organization adopts a need-based and livelihood-oriented training approach, ensuring that women acquire practical skills that lead to sustainable income generation, entrepreneurship, and long-term self-reliance.

To date, MANUVIKASA has covered over 11,500 women through skill-based training programs in both farm and non-farm livelihoods. These include tailoring, catering and food processing, dairy and livestock management, backyard poultry, beekeeping, sustainable agriculture, kitchen gardening, and beautician services. The trainings are designed to match local resource availability and market demand, enabling women to either strengthen existing livelihoods or initiate new income-generating activities.

In addition to technical skills, MANUVIKASA places strong emphasis on financial, digital, and institutional capacity building. Around 2,500 SHG representatives have been trained in digital literacy, including the use of bank accounts, UPI-based digital payments, mobile banking applications, and online government services. Further, more than 30,000 women have been oriented on SHG concepts, savings and credit management, entrepreneurship development, leadership, and group governance, strengthening the overall functioning and sustainability of SHGs.

Training programs are delivered through classroom sessions, hands-on practical demonstrations, exposure visits, and continuous mentoring. Post-training handholding includes linkage to credit through SHGs, cooperatives, banks, and MFIs, and market support through FPOs and cooperatives. This integrated approach has enabled women to enhance incomes, build confidence, and assume leadership roles within their families and communities.



d. Convergence with MGNREGA

MANUVIKASA actively facilitates women's participation in MGNREGA by supporting access to job cards, planning of works, work allocation, and timely wage payments. Nearly 8,000 labourers, with women as a priority group, receive an average of 50 days of employment per year through this convergence.

MGNREGA-supported works have resulted in the creation of durable community and individual assets, including farm ponds, water harvesting structures, bund strengthening, plantations, and community infrastructure. This approach has reduced seasonal migration, enhanced household income security, and strengthened long-term livelihood resilience.

Community Resource Persons (CRP) Model

MANUVIKASA has institutionalized a Community Resource Person (CRP) model to ensure sustainability, local ownership, and last-mile delivery.

CRPs—primarily trained women and youth from project villages—play a key role in:

- Mobilizing SHGs, farmers, and community institutions.
- Providing handholding support for agriculture, livelihoods, and SHG management.
- Facilitating convergence with government schemes (MGNREGA, NRLM, Agriculture & Horticulture departments).
- Supporting data collection, monitoring, and awareness generation.

The CRP model has strengthened community leadership, reduced dependency on external staff, and ensured continuity of interventions beyond project periods.



Clean Energy and Environmental Sustainability

MANUVIKASA promotes clean and energy-efficient household solutions:

- 150 smokeless chulhas
- 250 improved cooking stoves

These interventions prevent the burning of approximately 7,800 kg of firewood per day, significantly reducing indoor air pollution, women's drudgery, and carbon emissions.

In addition, MANUVIKASA is conserving 30,000 acres of community forest and common lands through plantations and community-led management. Using the CLART app and Community Land Management (CLM) systems, lands are geo-tagged, monitored, and digitally recorded. Gram Samitis / village committees have been formed to protect and manage these resources and developed community lands have been entered into the Gram Panchayat asset register, ensuring legal recognition, local ownership, and long-term sustainability.



Farmer Collectivization, Producer Organizations and cooperative

1. Pragatimitra North Kanara Farmers Producer Company (FPC)

Arecanut and allied value chains

- A total of 1010 shareholder farmers across Uttara Kannada
- End-to-end services including contract harvesting, processing (dehusking, polishing, drying, grading), input supply, soil testing, farm development, machinery hiring, trading of arecanut, spices and NTFPs, and seedling distribution
- Recognised with the “Krishi Alert” Award for innovative farmer services



2. Gokarna Tarakari Belegarara Raita Utpadakara Sangha (FPO)

Vegetable growers' collective – Majority Halakki Vokkaliga community

- Collective marketing, machinery rental, organic input supply, and value addition support
- Focus on improving income stability and market access for indigenous vegetable farmers



3. Fisherwomen Producer Organizations (3 FPOs)

Marine and inland fisheries

- A total of 1,500 women members
- Support for aggregation, storage, market access, value-added fish products, input supply, and institutional strengthening





4. Siddisiri Women Producer Organization (FPO)

NTFP-based livelihoods – Siddi tribal community

- Women-led FPO promoted among Siddi tribal households
- Aggregation and primary processing of Non-Timber Forest Produce (NTFP) such as honey, wild fruits, medicinal plants, and forest-based produce
- Input and output services including tools, packaging materials, storage, and market linkage support
- Strengthens women’s incomes, preserves traditional forest knowledge, and promotes sustainable harvesting practices



5. Pragatimitra Souharda Sahakari Niyamita – Women-Led Cooperative for Financial Inclusion

Pragatimitra Souharda Sahakari Niyamita is a women-centric cooperative promoted by MANUVIKASA to strengthen financial inclusion and livelihood security among rural women, particularly members of Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and other vulnerable households. The cooperative was established to provide timely, affordable, and accessible credit for income-generation activities, thereby reducing women's dependence on informal moneylenders and high-interest microfinance sources.

The cooperative currently has over 3000 shareholders, of which 95% are women, reflecting its strong women-led and inclusive character. Members primarily include SHG women engaged in agriculture, dairy, poultry, petty trade, tailoring, food processing, and other micro-enterprises. Through collective savings and share capital mobilisation, the cooperative has built a strong financial base to extend loans for both on-farm and non-farm livelihood activities.

Pragatimitra Souharda Sahakari Niyamita provides need-based loans at reasonable interest rates, aligned with the cash flow cycles of women-run enterprises. In addition to credit, the cooperative promotes financial literacy, savings discipline, digital transactions, insurance coverage, and responsible borrowing practices among its members. Women are trained in basic accounting, loan management, and enterprise planning, enabling them to manage their businesses sustainably.

By combining community ownership, professional management, and continuous handholding by MANUVIKASA, the cooperative has emerged as a reliable grassroots financial institution that empowers women economically, strengthens SHG enterprises, and contributes to long-term livelihood resilience and social empowerment.



Tribal Development and Siddi Community Support

MANUVIKASA has supported over 1150 Siddi tribal families through:

- Sustainable agriculture and horticulture training
- Beekeeping and poultry support
- NTFP value addition and processing units
- Youth skill training and hospitality exposure
- In Dongri GP, Ankola Taluk, 150 Siddi households are supported with NABARD assistance through SHG formation, leadership training, livelihood assets, health camps, and exposure visits.



Coastal Livelihoods and Fisherwomen Empowerment

In coastal regions, MANUVIKASA has empowered fisherwomen through:

- Training in cage fishing, dry fish processing, fish food stalls, and value-added fish products
- Business development and market support

Impact:

- Supported over 1,000 fisherwomen
- Improved household incomes
- Enhanced social status and leadership roles within fishing communities



Education Support and Child Development

Education is a key pillar of MANUVIKASA's work. The organization has supported:

- Educational kits and scholarships for orphans, semi-orphans, and underprivileged children
- Over 2,970 children benefited

Inclusive Education and Communication Development (IECD) Centres

MANUVIKASA runs 13 IECD Centres serving nearly 400 rural children, offering after-school academic support in Science, Mathematics, and English. These centres focus on first-generation learners and children from economically weaker backgrounds, helping bridge learning gaps, improve academic performance, and reduce dropouts through interactive teaching, assessments, and personalized mentoring.



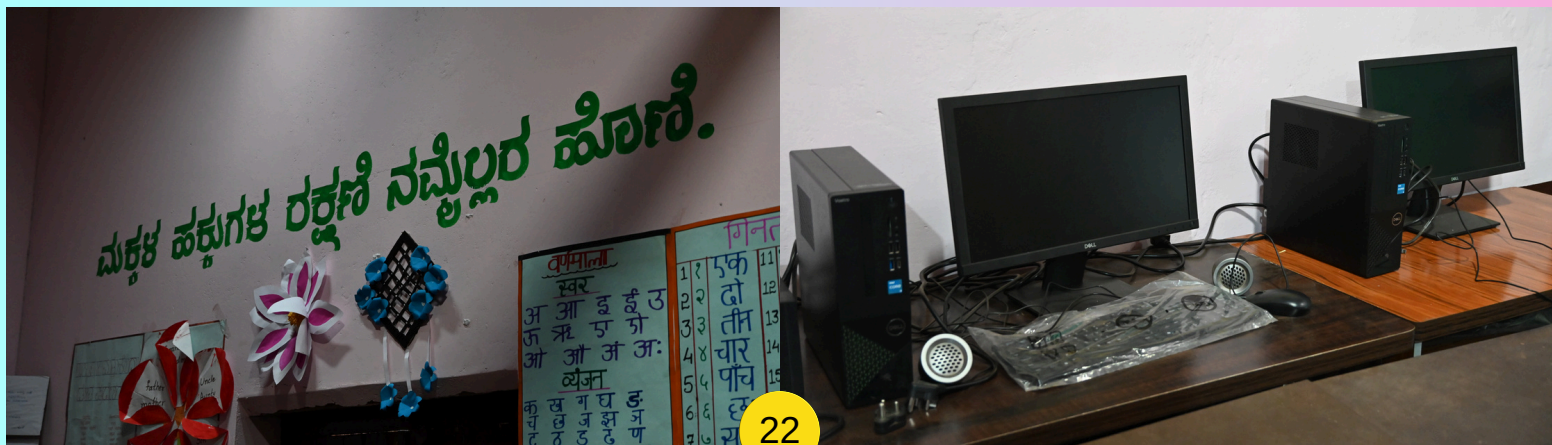
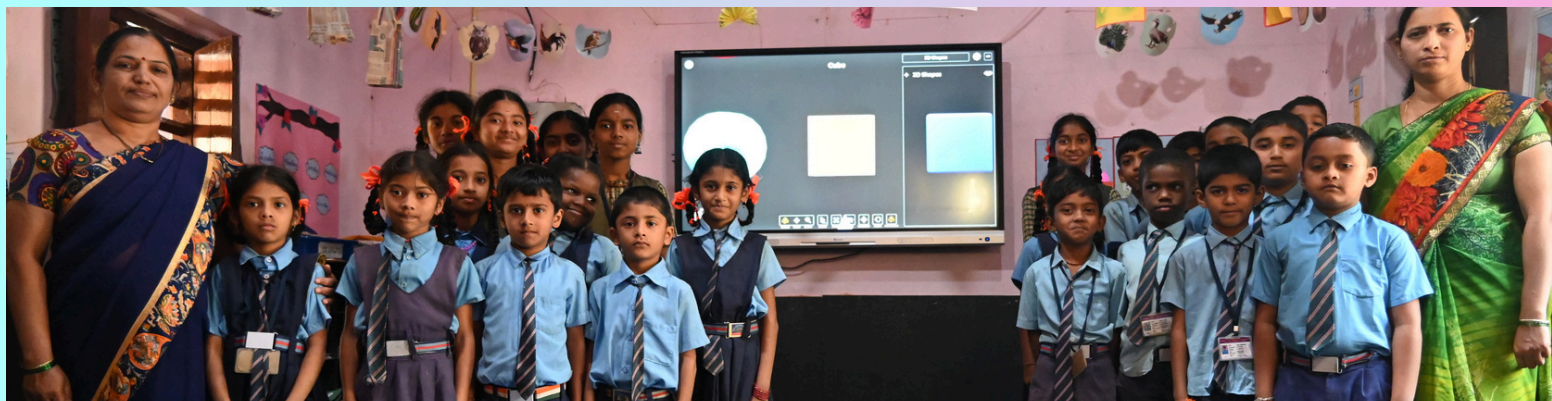
School Infrastructure Development

With support from Klüber Lubrication India Private Limited, MANUVIKASA renovated and upgraded the Government Higher Primary School at Baichagod village, Yellapur Block.

Key Improvements:

- Roof repair, plastering, and flooring
- Water purification and handwashing facilities
- Library with cupboards
- Two desktop computers and a smart interactive board with internet connectivity
- Teacher training on digital tools
- Wall paintings, notice boards, and learning aids

Around 30 students, mostly from tribal communities, now benefit from a safer, healthier, and digitally enabled learning environment.



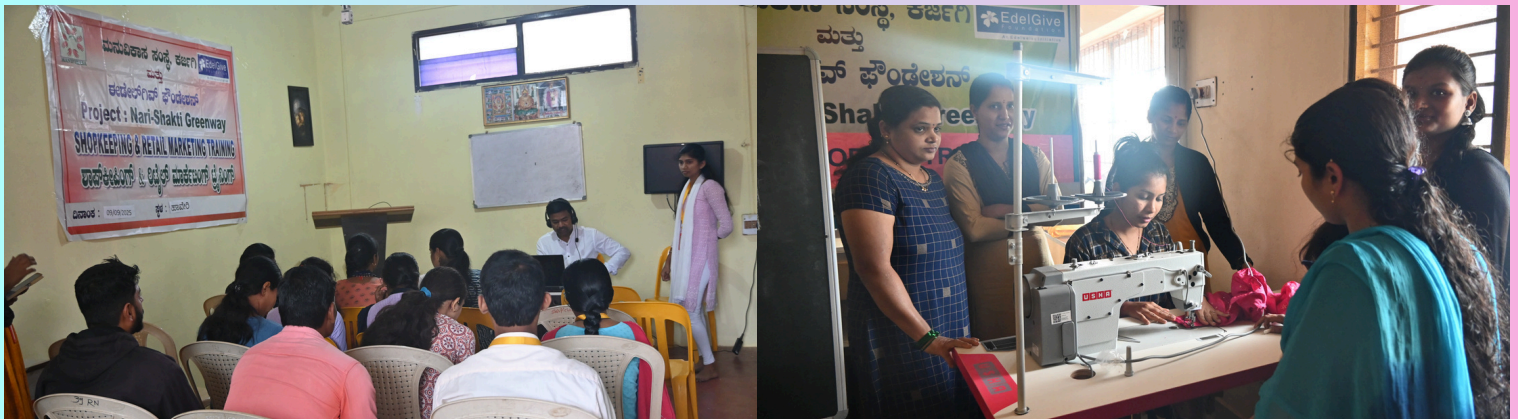
Youth Skill Development and Digital Literacy

With support from EdelGive Foundation under the Nari Shakti Greenway Project, MANUVIKASA established Continuous Training Centres (CTCs) and conducted trainings at Sirsi, Haliyal, and Yellapur, Honnavar, Kalaghatagi, Hanagal, Tilavalli, Kumta, Haveri, Shiggaon and Mundgod.

Training Areas Include:

- Advanced fashion designing
- Plumbing and electrician
- Shopkeeping and retail marketing
- Video editing
- Photography and videography
- Accounts and office maintenance

Additionally, MANUVIKASA promotes digital payments and banking through digital literacy programs for SHGs to reduce financial fraud and enhance financial inclusion.



Health, Nutrition, and Adolescent Development

MANUVIKASA is addressing adolescent malnutrition through targeted nutrition interventions. In Mundgod Block, 25 malnourished adolescents were identified and supported with nutritional supplements.

Health parameters such as height, weight, BMI, arm and chest circumference were monitored, showing significant improvements by the end of the project.



Disaster Response and Humanitarian Support

During the COVID-19 pandemic and natural disasters, MANUVIKASA provided large-scale relief:

- Dry ration kits to over 12,000 families
- Vaccination facilitation for 51,000+ people
- A total of 1980 families supported through shelter kits with the support of Amazon, Donatemarket, Ashraya Hatha Trust, Bengaluru etc.



Integrated Farming Systems and Climate Resilience – Khalaghatagi

In Khalaghatagi Taluk of Dharwad District, MANUVIKASA has begun targeted interventions to respond to the region's acute agrarian and water challenges, including declining groundwater levels, erratic rainfall patterns, and growing dependence on monocropping systems.

Building on this ongoing field engagement, MANUVIKASA has initiated a multi-year Integrated Farming Systems (IFS) and water conservation programme across 30+ villages in Khalaghatagi Taluk. The programme promotes diversified and climate-resilient farming systems by integrating sustainable agriculture practices, livestock-based livelihoods, water conservation and recharge structures, and strong community institutions. Through this integrated approach, the initiative aims to enhance farm incomes, strengthen food and nutrition security, and ensure long-term livelihood stability and ecological sustainability for small and marginal farmers.
